- 1. We had ice cream at the party. [We had <u>cake</u> at the party. (and)]
- 2. **The dance will be held in June.** [The dance will be held in July. (or)]
- 3. The coach wanted tall girls for the basketball team. [The coach wanted <u>fast</u> girls for the basketball team. (and)]
- 4. **The jogger ran up the street.** [The jogger ran <u>into a house</u>. (and)]
- 5. **The Girl Scouts will need more money.** [The Boy Scouts will need more money. (and)]
- 6. **There will be a medal for the winner.** [There will be <u>a prize</u> for the winner. (and)]
- 7. We'll paint the car orange. [We'll paint the car <u>maroon</u>. (or)]
- 8. **You can buy cotton candy at the booths.** [You can buy <u>popcorn</u> at the booths. (and)] [You can buy them from a vendor. (or)]
- 9. **The girls will play softball.** [The boys will play softball. (and)] [They will play soccer. (and)] They will play them together.
- 10. **The tomatoes will make a salad.** [They are the tomatoes <u>from our garden</u>. <u>The lettuce</u> will make a salad. (and)] It is lettuce <u>from yours</u>.
